

6th Grade Summer Reading 2023-2024

Dear Parents and Students,

Congratulations on the completion of another school year! The following is the 6th-grade summer reading requirement for the summer of 2023. The purpose of summer reading is to enjoy literature as well as prevent students' reading and writing skills from regressing. Incoming 6th-grade students are required to read and complete the following:

- 1. The students are required to read <u>one</u> novel from the list below.
 - a. The City of Ember by Jeanne DuPrau
 - b. Rules by Cynthia Lord
 - c. My Side of the Mountain by Jean Craighead George

**While selecting your novel, please read the synopsis, as well as reviews with your parents/guardians to ensure you're making the best decision for you and your family.

- 2. Students are required to complete all of the following items:
 - a. A written or typed response
 - b. The corresponding character analysis table (based on the book you chose to read)
 - c. One activity from the free choice grid.

****** All assignments are due on the first day of school for a 50-point project/test grade.

Written Response Requirements:

- The student's paper should be either written neatly with a black pen or typed.
- The students will need to answer the following questions in 2 paragraphs.
- Each paragraph should be a <u>minimum of 7 sentences</u>.
 - Paragraph 1:
 - Describe the main character from the novel. How does he or she change as the story progresses from start to finish?
 - What is the major conflict or struggle in the story? How does the story end?
 - Paragraph 2:
 - Which character in your novel did you connect with the most? <u>Why</u>?
 - What decisions are made in the novel that you agree with? Which decisions did you disagree with? <u>Why</u>?

Create a Collage	Rewrite the Ending:	You Be the Person:
Create a collage with pictures, icons, or other artwork to represent the action in this scene. There can be occasional words, but no full sentences.	First, describe the scene from the novel. Then rewrite a different ending to this scene. Feel free to be creative, but it should still fit the setting/theme of the story.	If you could switch places with any character in this scene, who would it be? Explain your choice, and describe what you would have done if you were in their position.
